



Background

During the global pandemic, Colonial Intermediate Unit, which provides educational, administrative, and technology services to more than 175,000 students-especially those with special needs-throughout the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, sought an online learning solution that would teach transitional and soft skills to students with special needs while also keeping them engaged on a remote platform.

The Challenge

Chapter 339 of the Pennsylvania School Code mandates that all school districts in the Commonwealth offer a comprehensive, sequential program of guidance services for children enrolled in Kindergarten through Grade 12. The program stresses career and post-graduate life readiness. While the Act provides students with ways of demonstrating postsecondary preparedness, the global pandemic shut down in-person learning, limiting opportunities, especially for students with special needs.

These students were severely affected by the transition to remote learning. 31 states reported declines in graduation rates of students with special needs during the pandemic. In a nationwide poll, more than half of school districts reported that it became "more difficult" or "substantially more difficult" to meet the requirements of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), the nation's special education law.

The Solution

Colonial Intermediate Unit partnered with Ori Learning–formerly known as ONEder Learning– to provide an online and remote curriculum to students with special learning requirements.

"Ori allowed us to connect with students in a way that maintained a high level of potential outcome for students because of the meaningfulness and the relevancy of the content embedded within that online curriculum," said Dan Cullen, Regional Supervisor of Special Education for Colonial Intermediate Unit.

Among Ori's solutions are a Social-Emotional Learning Curriculum, which provides students with opportunities to explore new skills and strategies, and a Transition Curriculum, which educates students on the fundamental "soft skills" needed to achieve and maintain successful employment.

Transition Curriculum

Ori's Transition Curriculum is designed for students with mild disabilities, ages 14 and up, who will be making the transition to life after high school. The research-based, blended curriculum gives educators what they need to teach the skills that are key to success in post-secondary life while meeting their student's Individual Education Plan (IEP) goals.
